LIVER CANCER



WHAT IS IT?

Liver cancer is the growth and spread of abnormal or unhealthy cells in the liver.



- ➤ Primary liver cancer, most commonly hepatocellular carcinomá (HCC), starts in the liver.
- **Secondary liver cancer** spreads to the liver from another part of the body.

SYMPTOMS

Symptoms often do not present until the cancer has progressed and may include:

- Appetite and weight loss
- Nausea or vomiting
- Jaundice (yellow skin/eyes)
- Itchy skin
- Pain in abdomen
- Swollen abdomen

RISK FACTORS

- Cirrhosis
- Hepatitis B or C
- **★** Excessive alcohol use
- Steatotic (fatty) liver disease
- Autoimmune liver disease
- Male gender
- Race/ethnicity
- Obesity
- Type-2 diabetes
- High-cholesterol
- Anabolic steroid use

DIAGNOSIS

Liver cancer can be diagnosed by physical exam, blood tests and imaging scans (i.e. ultrasound, MRI, CT scans). A biopsy, or genetic profiling of the tumor may also be performed to help quide personalized treatment.

Liver cancer incidence rates have more than tripled since 1980

TREATMENT

Treatment is based on several factors including the stage, or advancement, of the liver cancer and the patient's overall health. Some include:

- Ablation
- Chemotherapy
- Immunotherapy
- Liver resection
- Liver transplant
- Radiation

LIVER CANCER FACTS:

- Liver cancer is the 13th most common type of cancer in the U.S., and 6th worldwide.
- Cirrhosis, or advanced liver scarring, is the top risk factor for liver cancer. Cirrhosis is caused by chronic liver inflammation from conditions such as hepatitis B/C, longterm heavy alcohol use, steatotic (fatty) liver disease, and others.
- U.S. liver cancer rates are highest among Asian/Pacific Islanders followed by Hispanic/Latino, and Black/African American populations.
- Liver cancer is among the fastest-growing causes of cancer deaths in the U.S.
- Liver cancer death rates in the U.S. have more than doubled since 1980.
